EMERGENCY FINANCIAL AID GRANTS – QUARTER 4, 2021

In accordance with reporting requirements by the US Department of Education, the following information is provided to describe the use of funds distributed to Young Harris College for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. This information will be updated quarterly.

Student emergency grants distributed to eligible students can be used for any component of the student's cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care) or child care.

These funds are not considered financial aid and do not affect a student's current or future financial aid eligibility. Per guidance from the federal government, these grants were distributed to our students with exceptional need, which were identified by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). A separate email notification was sent to each student who is receiving funding.

1. An acknowledgement that the institution signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used the applicable amount of funds designated under the ARP program to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

As required by the CARES Act, in April 2020, Young Harris College signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement which also serves as formal acknowledgement and acceptance of subsequently awarded American Relief Plan (ARP) Act funds. The College will disburse no less than \$2,316,789 for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students which is the entirety of the funds awarded to Young Harris College.

2. The total amount of funds that the institution will receive or has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under the ARP program.

Young Harris College has received (was awarded) \$2,316,789 from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

Young Harris College distributed \$5,700 of Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students during the quarter ended December 31, 2021. Young Harris College has distributed \$1,712,272 in total Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students as of December 31, 2021

For the quarter ending December 31, 2021, 6 students received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant. 1,865 Emergency Financial Aid Grants have been awarded to students by Young Harris College as of December 31, 2021.

The quarter pertains to the calendar year, following the same cadence the reporting periods follows. The date of release should be reported as the deadline for form submission, 10 days after the end of each reporting period. A new separate form must be posted covering each quarterly reporting period (September 30, December 31, March 31, June 30), concluding after either (1) posting the quarterly report ending September 30, 2023 or (2) when an institution has expended and liquidated all (a)(I) Institutional Portion, (a)(2), and (a)(3) funds and checks the "final report" box. IHEs must post this quarterly report form no later than 10 days after the end of each calendar quarter (October 10, January 10, April 10, July 10). Each quarterly report must be separately maintained in a PDF document linked directly from the IHE's HEERF reporting webpage.
